
This year, Ask JES responded to nearly 6,000 legal help inquiries. Ask JES holds a wealth of information and resources in a legal database that we can pull from to answer questions. The areas with the most questions were Small Claims Court, family, and housing.

Ask JES Multilingual

This year, Ask JES Multilingual offered services in Chinese, Arabic, Punjabi, Hindi and French. Our services were integrated into the Ask JES legal help platform so that our Multilingual Legal Navigators could assist Ask JES clients in languages beyond English. We are now able to assist a larger population, including those who experience language barriers that prevent them from accessing other legal help resources.



Ask JES Multilingual provided legal education webinars to dozens of community groups including public libraries, universities, school groups, immigrant groups, and legal professionals. Presentation topics included tenancy rights, family law, cyber safety, fundamentals of law, writing wills, employment standards, interacting with police and more.



Increasing Access to Quality Childcare in BC

With funding from Women and Gender Equality Canada (WAGE), JES is engaged in a 3-year project to improve access to quality childcare in BC.



This past year, JES conducted a needs assessment, to better understand needs in the sector and how JES can effect systemic change. Based on feedback from the needs assessment, JES will:

- Improve working conditions through professional development training of educators and managers on BC employment standards and Gender, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion
- Increase access by providing training on available government funding and facility requirements to open new childcare centres
- Integrate JES legal education resources into ECE training
- Enhance sector collaboration by piloting mentorship programs to share insights and best practices

Impact Snapshot

- Responded to nearly 6,000 legal help questions
- Provided over 5000 referrals to legal help information and services
- Assisted over 3000 people with Provincial and Supreme Court questions

Empowering At-Risk and Sexually Exploited Women in BC

Also funded by Women and Gender Equality Canada (WAGE), JES is engaged in a 3-year project to reduce human trafficking in BC, especially of Indigenous girls and women. It is estimated that 50% of women sex trafficked in BC are Indigenous.

Having heard from Indigenous community members and frontline service providers, JES is now developing education content on a range of topics.

Live Streaming Legal Education

With court visits suspended since February 2020, JES pivoted to provide legal education directly to classrooms across BC through live streaming sessions. While the volume of legal education was lower than with court visits, there were some positives to providing legal education directly into BC learning experience for our trainees. schools.

Impact Snapshot

 4514 youth participants reached through 168 legal education webinars

 170 intermediaries educated through 10 professional development webinars

Despite COVID-19, our Indigenous Program has been able to accomplish tremendous work, impacting the lives Indigenous youth and providing training for youth service providers in Indigenous communities throughout BC.

Advancing Truth and Reconciliation

Working with the BC Association of Aboriginal Friendship Centers, JSEP-IP conducted hourlong interviews with 87 youth living in 35 Indigenous communities to better understand their legal education needs. The JES Indigenous Program Educator then delivered 8 legal education sessions to 112 youth. Topics included: Charter Rights, Contact with Police, Domestic Violence, Youth and Criminal Justice, Truth and Reconciliation

Education sessions presented to members of Gitxsan and Wet'suwet'en Nations, empowering 27 Indigenous girls to be safe online.

• Four workshops presented to 30 members of Tl'azt'en Nation on Youth in Care, Contact with Police, Youth Court and Gladue Rights.

The First Nations Health Authority (FNHA) invited JSEP-IP to provide education to their staff. Beginning with the 7 Nations of the Interior - the Dakelh Dené, Ktunaxa, Nlaka'pamux, Secwepemc, St'át'imc, Syilx and Tsilhqot'in, the JES Indigenous Program Educator facilitated 8 sessions on Advancing the Recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission to 168 participants.

The Indigenous Wellness Team at St. Paul's Hospital invited JSEP-IP to lead 2-day workshops to 64 participants. The workshop focused on relationship building between high-risk Indigenous community members and non-Indigenous service providers





DEVELOPING DIGITAL SOLUTIONS



INSTITUTIONAL JUSTICE STRENGTHENING PROJECT (GIJS)

Launch of ASTREA: Guatemala's Case Management Sytem for Victims of Violence

This year, JES launched ASTREA—a nationwide victim-centred IT platform that improves the capacity of prosecutorial and administrative staff to conduct criminal investigations, while ensuring comprehensive care for victims of violent crimes at the Public Prosecutor's Office (MP) of Guatemala.

Implemented at the Women's Offices (WPO) nationwide, ASTREA also links investigations with other MP offices, including the Children and Adolescents Office, the Femicide Office, and Human Trafficking Office.

The platform ensures quality care for victims, reduces revictimization and improves justice for women, children and adolescents.



JES provides specialized technical support and expert-led training.

At JES, we improve how justice institutions operate and train the professionals that have been entrusted to deliver justice using a train-the-trainer model.

Impact Snapshot — Guatemala's Public Prosecutor's Office:

- 1 nationwide Case Management Platform improving investigations of crimes against women
- 1 Victim Services Attention Protocol and Investigation Guidelines for persons with disabilities
- 148 wheelchairs donated at MP offices nationwide for greater accessibility
- 72 prosecutors trained on criminal proceedings involving human rights defenders
- 46 prosecutors trained in the investigation of torture and other cruel or inhumane crimes



Improving Services for People with Disabilities

JES designed and implemented a Victim Service Attention Protocol and Investigation Guidelines for Crimes against Persons with Disabilities for the MP and donated 148 wheelchairs to public prosecutors' offices nationwide for greater accessibility.

Improving the Investigation of Environmental Crime

A novelty this year, JES trained MP staff of the Environmental Crimes Office to strengthen their investigation through environmental legislation, the use of drones and GPS, water sampling evidence and Google Earth. The project delivered a Technical Guide for Investigating Water-related Crimes and Forest Resources and a geo-referencing system to strengthen data analysis for court case presentation.

Building a Case Management System for the Guatemala's Human Rights Ombudsperson's Office (PDH)

In 2021, JES initiated the design of a new Case Management System for Guatemala's Human Rights Ombudsperson's Office (PDH) and developed new strategies for improving vulnerable victim services, attention to Indigenous peoples and strategic litigation.

Due Diligence, Cultural-Sensitivity and Gender Training for PDH Staff

JES began in-person training in 2022 for PDH staff on human rights standards and due diligence in the care of people in conditions of vulnerability, including LGBTQ+ people, the elderly, people with disabilities, as well as training on the management of serious violations of human rights defenders.

- Claudia Maselli, Deputy Prosecutor of the PDH The project conducted a series of workshops and conversations, training 535 staff from 35 PDH offices across Guatemala, about cultural relevance and Indigenous cosmovision, effectively strengthening PDH care and attention towards Indigenous peoples.

The JES team also updated the PDH Gender Policy and designed an Inclusive Language Manual for staff to ensure greater gender equality and inclusivity.

Impact Snapshot — Guatemala's Human Rights Ombudsperson's Office (PDH):

- 62 PDH staff members trained on change management and digital transformation
- 535 staff from 35 PDH offices and 22
- departments of Guatemala trained on cultural relevance and Indigenous cosmovision

Guyana

STRENGTHENING JUSTICE FOR WOMEN, GIRLS AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES IN GUYANA

Increasing Access to Gender-Responsive Justice in Guyana

Launched in March 2022, the Strengthening Justice for Women, Girls and Indigenous Peoples in Guyana Project aims to deliver greater equality in access to justice for women and girls throughout Guyanese society, especially in remote Indigenous communities, where lack of access to justice is a principal concern.

The project focuses on building the capacity of justice actors, in particular the Guyana Police Force (GPF), to respond to sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV).

JES also supports women's groups, civil society organizations (CSOs) and Indigenous leaders to deliver gender-transformative and rights-based public legal education and information in order to strengthen community responses to cases of SGBV impacting women and girls in remote areas.

During this start-up period, JES hired the project team and initiated its needs-based consultations with local stakeholders, including the GPF, the Director of Public Prosecutions and the Judiciary.

JUSTICE FOR VICTIMS OF SEXUAL AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

Delivering Training to Improve Criminal Justice System Responses to SGBV

This year, JES provided important training and tools to 185 members of the judiciary on how to apply the Conventionality Control in the sentencing of SGBV cases. In addition, JES trained 56 judges from 8 regions in Honduras on "Judging with a Gender Perspective".

JES also delivered training on the "Criminal Investigation of Femicide Cases" to strengthen the Inter-institutional Commission for Monitoring Investigations of Violent Deaths of Women and Femicides (Femicide Commission), comprised of CSOs and government institutions. The course allowed participants to better understand how criminal investigations are built and which methodologies must be used, while raising awareness about the challenges in constructing a solid femicide case.

Integrating Gender Perspectives in Honduras

At the request of the Human Rights Secretariat of Honduras, JES developed a course on "Human Rights, Gender and LGBTQI+ within the legal process in Honduras," aimed at fostering a structural transformation within the high-ranking public officials, investigators and law enforcement of the Public Prosecutor's Office (MP) of Honduras, Secretary of Security, Attorney General, Human Rights Secretariat and National Penitentiary Institute.

JES also donated equipment to the Public Prosecutor's Office, including anatomically detailed (AD) dolls for identification of children sexual abuse, portable information kiosks on domestic violence, and equipment to improve Gesell chambers to avoid revictimization and ensure a fair trial for SGBV victims.

Impact Snapshot

- 136 justice professionals (74% female) trained on first response to SGBV crime
- 121 justice professionals (75% female) trained on sentencing with a gender perspective
- 99 justice professionals and CSO representatives (80% female) reached and trained on tools for SGBV risk assessment and safety planning
- 28 social workers and CSO representatives trained in the promotion and protection of victims' rights through legal mechanisms
- 9 Gesell Chambers improved at MP offices across Honduras to protect victims of SGBV

BUILDING A TECHNOLOGICAL PLATFORM TO SUPPORT VICTIM SERVICES

AYUDA.GT: Guatemala's National Victim Services Website and Platform

Following its launch in March 2021, JES made improvements to <u>Ayuda.gt</u>—a centralized platform providing public legal information and services for victims of violence in Guatemala in Spanish and 4 Mayan languages. As a result, victims of crime, particularly women, children, Indigenous populations and other vulnerable groups have gained greater access to information and services.

Online Courses and Training on Victimology

JES delivered training to the Victims' Attention Office of the Public Prosecutor's Office (MP) and to non-governmental service-providers on the use of dashboards, data privacy and security. The team also provided technical assistance in data analysis to the Department of Victim Services (DCAV) at the MP, improving coordination and guality of care for victims in Guatemala.

The project delivered training and coaching to victim referral network coordinators, which included online training, guides, presentations, videos and interactive materials to support the onboarding of new organizations.

Between July and September 2021, JES designed and delivered 6 courses on victimology for the MP and CSOs on services for:

- LGBTQI+ people
- People with disabilities
- Children and adolescent victims of crime
- Women
- Indigenous peoples

Given its success, the courses on victimology were made available to Indigenous leaders and the public. The project was conducted in collaboration with Fundación Sobrevivientes and the MP.

Panama



STRENGTHENING INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY TO COMBAT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Combatting Human Trafficking in Panama, Costa Rica and Colombia

JES launched a new project this year in Panama, Costa Rica and Colombia to improve local capacity and gender-responsive practices in investigating and prosecuting human trafficking cases. The project will continue until 2024, and aims to reduce impunity for transnational crimes and provide greater justice for victims, especially women and girls.

New Office in Panama City

JES set up its new office in the City of Knowledge (Ciudad del Saber) in Panama City and conducted a gender-responsive diagnostic in Panama, Costa Rica, and Colombia, where JES is working for the first time.

Consultations were carried out by experts with Public Prosecutors' Offices, National Police, Forensics

Institute, the Judiciary, and Human Trafficking Commissions of all three countries, as well as international organizations and CSOs.

Major Case Management (MCM) Course

JES delivered its online inter-institutional Major Case Management (MCM) fundamentals course aimed at developing specialized capacities for investigators and Criminal Intelligence Analysis (CIA) courses with the investigative police in Panama. The team planned future programming and designed courses in advanced MCM, investigative interviewing and identification of human trafficking cases, as well as trial preparation for Panama and Costa Rica.

Impact Snapshot

- 3 online courses developed in Major Case Management and Criminal Intelligence Analysis
- 49 investigators trained with 40% female participants

JES HIGHLIGHTS 2021/22

GUARANTEEING DIFFERENTIATED ATTENTION TO CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS IN CRIMINAL CASES



This year, JES completed its first UNICEF-funded project aimed at guaranteeing the application of differentiated procedures and care in criminal cases involving children and adolescents in Guatemala.

Conducted in collaboration with JES' Guatemala Institutional Justice Strengthening (GIJS) project for the Public Prosecutor's Office (MP), the UNICEF project designed and integrated new components to the MP's Case Management System (ASTREA) to address and improve institutional responses in criminal processes and care for cases involving children and youth.

The project also allows better management and coordination of criminal cases under the jurisdiction of the MP's Offices for Crimes Involving Children and Adolescents, Adolescents in Conflict with the Criminal Law, and the Human Trafficking Office.

Finally, JES delivered training to 368 MP staff in the use and implementation of this new component, ensuring sustainability and contributing to protecting the rights of children and adolescents.

Despite challenges from COVID-19, JES completed another successful year with new activities, communications milestones, and innovative program partnerships.
